

CITY OF LEMON GROVE EDIBLE FOOD RECOVERY GUIDE

Senate Bill 1383 & Edible Food Recovery

To reduce food waste and help address food insecurity, SB 1383 requires a 20 percent recovery of edible food, that would otherwise be sent to landfills, to feed people in need. The law requires that cities establish edible food recovery programs, help connect mandated edible food generators with food recovery organizations and services and ensure there is sufficient capacity for all the edible food to be recovered.

Lemon Grove's Edible Food Recovery Program

The following section defines the terms that are associated with edible food recovery and provides information and resources regarding Lemon Grove's Edible Food Recovery Program.

Food Recovery: Collecting edible food that would otherwise go to waste and redistributing it to feed in need.

Food Recovery Organization: An entity that collects and transports edible food from food businesses and distributes it directly to the public. Many food recovery organizations are trained in food safety and handling protocols for food transportation.

Food Recovery Service: An entity that collects and transports edible food from food businesses to a food recovery organization or other entities for distribution.

Commercial Edible Food Generator Requirements

Tier 1 Generators (e.g., grocery stores, supermarkets, food distributors, and food service providers) **Tier 2 Generators** (e.g., restaurants, health facilities, hotels, and large venue or events)

Must do the following:

- 1. Arrange to recover the maximum amount of excess edible food that would otherwise go to landfills;
- 2. Establish a written edible food agreement, such as <u>CalRecycle's Model Food Recovery Agreement</u>, with partnering organizations/services that accept edible food; and
- 3. **Maintain records** that include a list of each food recovery organization or service that collects or receives your surplus edible food. The records are to include the name, address, and contact information of each food recovery organization and/or services, as well as the types of food and frequency of donation, and records of quantities of surplus edible food recovered (in pounds per month). Reporting on these activities annually by submitting the <u>Edible Food Recovery Annual Reporting Form</u> to the City would meet this requirement. Lastly, both records and agreements must be available to the City or contract staff during inspections or as requested.
- 4. Noncompliance is subject to an Administrative Citation with escalating penalties.

No States	Food Recovery Hierarchy
Hoose present and	Source Reduction Reduce the volume of surplus food generated
	Feed Hungry People onate extra food to food banks, soup kitchens and shelters
	Feed Animals Divert food scraps to animal food
	Industrial Uses Provide waste oils for rendering and fuel conversion and food scraps for digestion to recover energy
	Composting Create a nutrient-rich solf amendment
	Landfill/ Incineration Last resort to disposal
